A Message from Our President

On behalf of the members of the Texas Oil & Gas Association, we are pleased to release our annual Energy & Economic Impact Report.

I continue to be awestruck by the extraordinary role oil and natural gas play in our state and national economy. From the hundreds of thousands of jobs, to the every-day products that are created from oil and natural gas, the industry continues to make modern life not only possible but undeniably better. These benefits manifest themselves in a variety of ways ranging from national security to personal safety to economic stability.

On the economic front, Fiscal Year 2022 was a record-breaking blockbuster year for tax revenue from the oil and natural gas industry—money that will go to work for the people of Texas.

The Texas oil and natural gas industry paid \$24.7 billion in state and local taxes and state royalties—the highest total in history—shattering the previous record of just over \$16 billion set in 2019 by 54%. This revenue from oil and natural gas production, pipelines, refineries, and liquified natural gas (LNG) facilities translates to roughly \$67 million a day that pay for our schools, universities, roads, first responders and essential services.

While this report details the enormous economic impact of the oil and natural gas industry for all Texans, we also recognize that many parts of the world are struggling for reliable, affordable, and secure energy. At this moment, the world understands energy security is a necessity, not a luxury and our allies are literally knocking at our door in energy need.

In addition to cementing America's energy security, Texas' natural gas producers, pipelines, refiners and exporters are playing an essential role in delivering stability in the form of affordable, reliable energy to our trade partners, even in times of continued global unrest.

Our industry's ability to deliver at home and abroad is directly tied to policies and politics in Texas and across our nation that will determine if we can continue to be that trusted ally or if nations will have to look elsewhere.

At every level we need bold energy policy leadership that promotes energy freedom, global stability, and environmental progress. All three will allow the Texas oil and natural gas industry to continue building a cleaner, stronger, better future for everyone.




In FY 2022, the Texas oil and natural gas industry paid state and local taxes and state royalties totaling

Texas oil and natural gas industry jobs continue to be good for Texas as well as for the families and communities these jobs support.

Direct oil and natural gas employment plus the industry's spending on expenses such as capital goods, electricity, construction, services and supplies generate more than 1.4 million jobs.

Every direct job in the Texas oil and natural gas industry creates an additional 2.2 Texas jobs.





Texas oil and natural gas employers paid an average of \$115,302 per job in 2022. Other private sectors averaged \$67,725, roughly 40 percent less than what oil and natural gas companies paid their employees.

On a per-employee basis, the Texas oil and natural gas industry paid \$56,000 in state and local taxes and state royalties in 2022.

This is over 9 times higher than the other private sectors, which paid an average of just over \$6,000 on a per-employee basis.

Per-job contributions matter because most state and local spending needs are driven by the size of the population.

In a system that relies so heavily on business to pay the cost of government, it is clear that the oil and natural gas industry more than pays its share in Texas.

Benefits like these are not guaranteed

Many parts of the world are struggling for reliable, affordable, and secure energy, and many of the struggles are a result of man-made choices, decisions, policies, and actions that have had dire consequences for families and communities with unmet needs.

At this moment, the world understands energy security is a necessity, not a luxury. But the oil and natural gas industry faces considerable headwinds from Washington—which discourage exploration and production, cancel pipelines and encourage divestment from oil and natural gas.

These actions hurt American consumers and diminish our nation's security because **energy security is national security**. Clearly, Texas has the natural resources, manpower and infrastructure to make the world a more energy secure place, and we must continue to push back on federal policies that threaten this nation's ability to prosper and this industry's contributions to a cleaner, stronger, better future.

Policies and politics in Texas and across our nation will determine if we can continue to be that trusted ally or if nations will have to look elsewhere.

America needs **bold leadership on energy policy**—not political obstructionism that stands in the way of energy freedom and environmental progress.





FUELING PUBLIC EDUCATION

The Texas oil and natural gas industry plays a significant role in funding public education in the state. Through a variety of taxes and royalties, the industry helps to provide much-needed funding for schools, teachers, and students.

This support is critical to the future of our state, and serves as an important example of the industry's contributions to the next generation of Texas leaders.

Oil and natural gas royalties to state funds, particularly the Permanent University Fund and Permanent School Fund, widely support Texas public education. In FY 2022, each fund received over

more than double the amounts from last year. In fact, 99% of the state's oil and natural gas royalties were deposited into these funds. Additionally, independent school districts in Texas received oil and natural gas property taxes totaling

FUELING THE RAINY DAY FUND

Texans know that the oil and natural gas industry anchors our economy and directly funds our roads, schools, emergency services and our Rainy Day Fund.

This support is critical for our state, and ensures funding for our state and local governments.

The Texas oil and natural gas industry is the primary funding source for the Economic Stabilization ("Rainy Day") Fund, contributing more than

\$28.1 BILLION

since the Fund's inception in 1987. This amounts to

89 PERCENT

of the Fund's revenue over time. Legislators have appropriated funds from the ESF 114 times, the first of which was to fund public education in Texas. The sum of all appropriations totals

\$18.2 BILLION


Without the direct funding from taxes paid by the Texas oil and natural gas industry, support for retired teachers, disaster recovery, healthcare services, and numerous other priority items would not have received the substantial dollars allocated to meet essential needs.


